Each year, the VESS awards a Travel Grant, an Early Career Faculty Research Grant and a Resident Research Grant. Here, we catch up with previous awardees to find out how they used their funds and what impact the award had on their career. 1. How did you use the funding from the Resident Research Award?

As the recipient of the 2018 VESS Resident Research Award, I used the funds to explore the mechanistic causes of abdominal aortic aneurysm (AAA) formation. AAA are a life-threatening cardiovascular disease characterized by an inflammatory macrophage phenotype that contributes to pathological vascular remodeling and predisposes patients to the potentially fatal consequence of aortic rupture. Identifying the mechanisms regulating macrophage-mediated inflammation during AAA development are of critical importance to developing novel pharmacological therapies to prevent AAA progression. Recent evidence indicates that that epigenetic enzymes, specifically the histone demethylase JMJD3, play a critical role in establishing tissue macrophage phenotype. Using both human tissue samples and a mouse model of AAAs, we uncovered that JMJD3 regulates macrophage inflammation and pathological aortic dilation. Further we established that pharmacological inhibition of JMJD3 could prevent AAA development.

2. How did the Resident Research Award help you in your professional development? What professional achievements came from this Award?

The Resident Research Award was extremely important for my professional and academic development. From a research standpoint this award provided me with the finances to establish a murine aortic aneurysm model at our institution and pursue novel single cell sequencing analysis from human tissue samples collected from the operating room. Through these projects I was able to collaborate with multiple faculty in Departments of Immunology, Pathology and Dermatology in order to build my research network and allow me to acquire new research techniques. The data generated from this grant was presented at multiple national meetings including the Society of Vascular Surgery Vascular Research Initiatives Conference, the Society of Vascular Medicine Conference during which we were awarded the resident research prize, and the Association of Immunology Conference. During these conferences, I was able to network with other vascular surgeon-scientists and obtain insights on career development topics such as time management, the benefits and pitfalls of acquiring administrative roles, and maximizing grant funding opportunities. Most importantly, the work from this Award was published in the *Journal of Experiment Medicine* (PMID 33779682) and provide the key preliminary data for obtain a National Institutes of Health RO1 grant for which I am a Co-Investigator.

3. What advice would you have for young vascular surgeons who are starting out and applying for grants?

As you embark on a career as a surgeon scientist, applying for research grants, including IRB regulation, data collection, and manuscript publication, is a valuable lesson for an academic vascular surgery. Indeed, it is still one I am constantly learning each day. When working on grant applications, first it is essential to establish a diverse mentorship team consisting of senior surgeons and research scientists who will help you navigate the waters of clinical obligations and research goals. These trusted advisors can provide important advice on the overall progress of your research pursuits, review specific aims, and aid in the establishments of connections that allow you to accomplish your experimental goals. Second, it is important to take advantage of all opportunities to present your data at departmental or interdepartmental research meetings to get diverse and meaningful feedback. Afterall, during grant study sections (both at the national and societal level) a diverse array of experienced researchers will be evaluating your submission. By presenting you data broadly and hearing multiple opinions before the submission you can improve your grant so that it will be well received by a diverse audience. Lastly, and probably most importantly, persistence is key. Like surgery, perfection in research and grant writing comes with continual practice, incorporating grant critiques into new experimental ideas, and ultimately turning weaknesses into strengths.

4. Looking back, how did the VESS Resident Research Award influence your career?

This award was instrumental in launching my academic career. Perhaps mostly because it taught me the process of grant writing and showed me the value in identifying good mentors. Further it allowed me the opportunity to take an experimental plan and bring it to completion while experiencing all the trials and triumphs that come along with a research career. The VESS Resident Research Award gave me the opportunity to confirm my desire to enter the field of a vascular surgeon-scientist and I am very grateful to VESS for this.

5. What do you see as the most valuable thing the VESS has to offer the young surgeon?

VESS is a fantastic organization for junior surgeons to become involved in prominent national society at an early point in their career. Through its diverse community of faculty, fellows/residents, and medical students, it provides a valuable platform for surgeons to meet colleagues, establish mentorship, share excitements and concerns all while grow together in the field of vascular surgery. I look forward to many more VESS meetings in the future.

Virtual Residency Fair

The second annual VESS virtual residency fair was held in September of this year. **138 medical students** took part in this experience which included a residency panel discussion about the match and interview process with current vascular trainees followed by time to visit with individual programs via separate Zoom rooms. Forty-six integrated vascular surgery programs participated from across the country, and interested students had the opportunity to see short descriptions of the participating programs on the VESS website. The descriptions also contained the individual program's website links allowing a more in depth investigation of programs. The participating students were enrolled as "student members" in the VESS and will hopefully stay involved in the society as they move through their training. One participating student reported, "I absolutely loved this residency fair. I hope it continues for many years and I would be willing to help make that happen. The residency fair attendance by faculty, residents, and trainees was phenomenal and I appreciate the opportunity to visit a few more programs than I otherwise would have." Given the success of the event, the VESS is looking into hosting a virtual fellowship fair later in the year for current general surgery trainees entering the vascular surgery fellowship match. 2021 Spring Meeting Recap



Despite the prediction that the pandemic would fizzle out by the summer of 2021, it would seem that the pandemic is still alive and well. However, this thankfully did not prevent the SVS and VESS from having a successful in-person meeting this past August in San Diego. It was clear by the robust attendance that Zoom fatigue was very real and there was a great yearning for the energy and camaraderie of an in-person meeting. The excitement of being in-person (for many the first time in over a year) was palpable.

The VESS had a very successful session held on Wednesday August 18th, 2021 from 12:45 – 6:30 pm. Unlike prior years, the VESS session this year was held in the main ballroom and the turnout for the event did not disappoint. The session was complete with the return to live discussants and despite a COVID surge in parts of the United States, only 2 presentations had to be converted to the preloaded version.

We congratulate the VESS Spring Program Committee led by **Dr. Shang Loh** (Chair), and included **Drs. Caitlin Hicks, Bjoern Suckow**, and **Karen Woo**, who are completing their second year on the program committee. They were joined by **Drs. Sharon Kiang, Nathan Liang**, and **Jeffrey Siracuse**, who are in their first year of the two-year commitment. They worked with the SVS/VESS Joint Program Committee led by **Dr. Andy Schanzer** to select a spectacular line-up of papers for our session.

A total of **662 abstracts** were submitted to VAM. We selected **twenty-six** (**26**) **abstracts** for the Spring Program. This included five presentations on aortic disease, four presentations on cerebrovascular disease, three presentations on peripheral vascular disease, with the remainder of the **14 abstracts** covering topics in vascular education, surgeon wellness, venous disease, reno-visceral occlusive disease, trauma, and disparities. All of the presenter did an excellent job with great audience engagement. **Seventeen discussants** were selected consisting of senior trainees and first year attendings who did an outstanding job asking insightful questions and stimulating discussion.

We were extremely excited this year to be able to compile a very inclusive program and worked hard to ensure that we were able to include participants from a wide number of institutions. We had authors spanning across **21 different institutions** with discussants selected from 16 different institutions. Together, the presenters and discussants represented **34 unique institutions** which is outstanding to be able to represent so many different institutions. This inclusiveness really demonstrates VESS' commitment to diversity and promotion of the young vascular surgeon. All projects will be considered for potential publication in the *Journal of Vascular Surgery*.

SPRING PROGRAM COMMITTEE (2 Year Term)

Review applications and select winners for awards (Travel, Resident Research and Early Career Faculty). Also review any requests to survey the VESS membership and submit recommendation to the Executive Council.

MEMBERSHIP DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE (2 Year Term)

Assist with member recruitment strategy when necessary. Review list of applicants and present nominations for membership to the Executive Council for review before final vote during the Annual Business Meeting.

BYLAWS COMMITTEE (3 Year Term)

Review the by-laws from time-to-time as directed by the Council and make recommendations regarding amendments. Assist with the development of official policies & procedures for Society business.

VASCULAR RESIDENCY ISSUES COMMITTEE (2 Year Term)

Develop programs (i.e.: Technology Forum, Fellows Program) and address issues of vascular trainees.


STUDENT EDUCATION COMMITTEE (2 Year Term)
