Journalism and Politics






Early newspapers helped to promote the Revolutionary War

- The leaders of the revolt used the press to drum up public support for their cause
- In 1776 Thomas Paine wrote *Common Sense* to explain the idea of revolution in words that uneducated people could understand
- It sold 120,000 copies and was reprinted in newspapers




After the war... the 'partisan' newspaper

The Steam Engine and the Industrial Revolution

- This new technology: steam powered engine allowed for printing of 4000 copies of a newspaper in an hour
- Reduced the price of a newspaper to 1cent
- The "Penny Press" was born.. The first truly mass media



The Birth of the "Modern Newspaper"



- Free of government or party control
- Simple wording
- Organized with city staff covering regular beats and spot news
- DC and foreign correspondents
- Topped 40,000 circulation within15 months
- Herald Tribune (spinoff) is still published now

"Yellow Journalism"

- By the end of the 19th century, newspapers were the nation's main source of information
- As huge newspaper empires grew, so did the competition and circulation wars
- "Yellow journalism" used sensationalism as a way to increase readership: loud headlines on sin, sex, rumors, even fake stories



The "one off" problem

It began when one publisher...

- Joseph Pulitzer owned the St. Louis Post Dispatch and took over the New York World in 1883
- He was a crusader for hard news, but liked to present it with sensationalism
- At first he demanded accuracy from his reporters



William Randolph Hearst

- William Randolph Hearst owner of the San Fransisco Examiner, bought New York Journal in 1895
- He loved politics and hoped to run for president
- Taking on Pulitzer as a rival, his paper emphasized crime, sex, scandals, and violence


The battle raged over comic strips



- Pulitzer was the first publisher to run comic strips in his paper
- He and Hearst fought over the "Hogan's Alley" comic strip printed in yellow ink, by James Outcalt
- The term "yellow journalism" came to mean any sensational, inaccurate reporting

It continued over "stunt journalism"


- Both publishers used publicity stunts to build readership:
- Pulitzer sent "Nelly Bly" up in a hot air balloon
- She also pretended to be out of her mind in order to investigate conditions in insane asylums

- Some newspapers adopted codes of ethics and standards of fairness and accuracy


- Adolph Ochs bought the New York Times in 1896







Conclusion: This difference in reporting trends may partly explain the discrepancy in how well people are informed about U.S. and Iraqi civilian fatalities in Iraq. Furthermore, this calls into question the role of the media in reporting and sustaining armed conflict, and the extent to which newspaper and other media reports can be used as data to assess fatalities or trends in the time of war.




Figure 3 Number of articles per month reporting Coalition and Iraqi civilian death tallies in 11 US newspapers.

NEW YORK - Pfc. Jessica Lynch said Tuesday she is disturbed that the military seemed to overdramatize her rescue by U.S. troops and spread false stories that she went down shooting in an Iraqi ambush.

"That wasn't me. I wasn't about to take credit for something I didn't do," she told The Associated Press. "I'm not that person."

The 20-year-old former Army supply clerk twig-thin and weary, one crutch close at hand described her ordeal in a Veterans Day interview seven months after the rescue made her a national hero.

Reports circulated by the U.S. military early in the war said Lynch waged a fierce gunbattle with Iraqi fighters who ambushed her 507th Maintenance Company on March 23 at Nasiriyah. She has since said her rifle jammed, and she did not get off a shot.

And Lynch's new book points out that, despite the "tension and drama" of the military videotape showing gun-toting U.S. soldiers rushing into an Iraqi hospital to rescue her, the hospital staff never resisted, and even offered the troops a key.

"It disturbed me," Lynch said. "I knew that it wasn't the truth."

Still, the ex-prisoner of war from rural West Virginia took pains to say that she does not care why the military may have exaggerated her story. and that she considers the soldiers who rescued her April 1 to be heroes.

"No matter what it was, the point is that they got in there, they rescued me, and they took me home safe," she said.





The JFK Photo That Could Have Changed History

Professor Jeff Seclik, a forenaic photo expert, says the print appears to be authentic. Sediik says the photo is printed on paper consistent with what was used in the 1950s. The emulsion on the surface of the print has numerous cracks -- the result of aging and hendling.

STACKING: The reverse chronological order - the de facto standard for blogging... Whatever is on top is considered NEWS (no time for fact checking or vetting)

Media historian W. J. Cambell once identified the distinguishing markers of yellow journalism as follows:

- Prominent headlines that screamed excitement about ultimately unimportant news
- Lavish use of pictures (often of little relevance)
- Impostors, frauds, and faked interviews
- Color comics and a big, thick Sunday supplement
- Ostentatious support for the underdog causes
- Use of anonymous sources
- Prominent coverage of high society and events.

% of U.S. adults who say completely made-up news has caused _____ about the basic facts of current events



% of U.S. adults who are _____ in their ability to recognize made-up news







- Essentially, be critical especially when you read online content






